### **12. USE ESCC'S LRC WEB PAGE – for an Internet Search.**

Choose **Google.com** to search for an article on any topic of your choice.

Be sure to find one that includes appropriate, reliable, up-to-date information. That means you need to evaluate the Web page! Use the checklist below to answer questions or make notes that will help you evaluate the information.

- Does the article have an author?
- Does the Web site list the credentials of the author (or organization, etc.)?
- Why was the research compiled or the Web site designed?
- Was the site posted or updated recently? Is the date important for your topic?
- Is there a bibliography or any references to other sources used?
- Does the page have working hypertext links?
- Is the source biased, one-sided or does it acknowledge opposing views?
- Is the information relevant or appropriate to your topic?
- Is the Web site linked to a federal agency (.gov)?
  - non-profit agency (.org)?
  - network (.net)?
  - business (.com)?
  - educational institution (.edu)?
  - personal Internet account (.name)?
- Does the site have spelling or grammar errors?
- Can you corroborate the facts in other sites or materials?
- Review your responses above. Do you believe the site is a reliable source?
